

## Tuition Assistance

Archdiocesan Catholic Schools are supported by parishes through an assessment of approximately 10.9 percent of parish ordinary income. These resources are used to reduce construction mortgages for five schools built in 1999-2000 and to provide tuition assistance to Catholic families.



## Catholic Schools

### GRACE Scholars

Georgia taxpayers can make a no-cost contribution to GRACE Scholars, a Student Scholarship Organization (SSO) founded by the bishops of Georgia. GRACE Scholars provides Catholic schools scholarship dollars to award to students with financial need. Contributions are "no cost," as they are eligible for a 100 percent tax credit against state income taxes.

In school year 2018-19, \$5.4 million was contributed from donors throughout the state, of which \$3.7 million was collected right here in the Archdiocese of Atlanta. As a result, 762 students in archdiocesan schools received \$2.7 million in scholarship dollars for the 2018-19 school year.

### Archbishop's Banquet for Catholic Education

Through the generosity of sponsors for the annual Archbishop's Banquet for Catholic Education, the Office of Catholic Schools awarded six scholarships in the amount of \$3,500.00 each to children of school, parish, and chancery employees in the 2018-19 school year.

### Financial Aid Funding Sources

During the 2018-19 school year, applicants for financial aid demonstrated need totaling \$11.2 million dollars. Through archdiocesan and local school efforts, \$9.1 million dollars, or 81 percent, of the need was satisfied, easing the financial strain for families wishing to secure a Catholic education for their children.

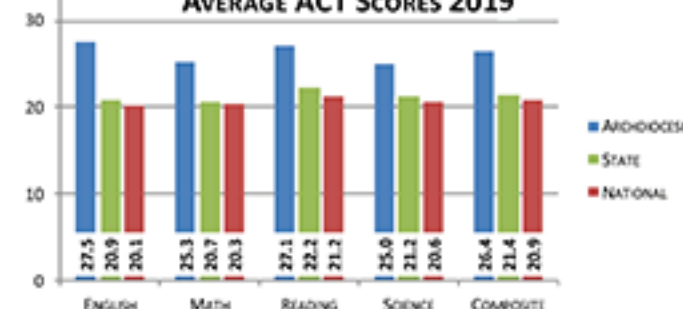
